15th Palau Community College Science Student Symposium

On Thursday, May 15, 2014 the fifteenth annual Palau Community College (PCC) Science Student Symposium was held at the PCC Assembly Hall. The PCC Science Student Symposium is a presentation of the researches and projects conducted by students under the science programs as part of their educational experiences.

This year's science symposium featured the research presentations of Environmental Marine Science students Kyah M. Remeliik and Fabio Siksei. Ms. Remeliik and Mr. Siksei were interns at the Palau International Coral Reef Center (PICRC). During their internships, Ms. Remeliik and Mr. Siksei conducted different studies on Palau's marine life under the mentorship of PICRC researchers.

The symposium also featured the projects of Information Technology (IT) student Joseph Anastacio. Mr. Anastacio applied the skills he had learned in the classroom in assisting clients in need of technical support. His two clients were PCC and Emmaus High School. Dr. Black is the Senior Historian and Director of the Division of the Senior Historian at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. He has held numerous teaching positions including Emeritus Professor of Anthropology at George Mason University.

Dr. Black is also the President and Director of the Friends of Tobi Island (FOTI) non-profit organization. FOTI is a collaborative project between the people of Tobi that documents the Ramari Hatohobei, a severely endangered language. During his visit, Dr. Black met with PCC President Dr. Patrick U. After finishing the regular season in third place, the Palau Community College (PCC) Mesekiu Baseball Team fought their way into the 2014 Palau Major League (PML) Championship against the defending champions Airai Aces.

To reach the championship game, the young PCC Mesekiu Team easily disposed Ngebeches team by winning the first two games of a best-of-three playoff series. PCC then upset the pennant winners from Ngerbeched behind the striking pitch of David Salapwa and the impressive offensive run-production of Vincent Kulas, Ray Rumong, and veteran Kaleb Meltel. The win set up a best-of-five championship series with the defending champions Airai Aces.

On Wednesday, May 21, 2014 PCC suffered a lopsided loss to the Airai Aces. However, the team quickly regrouped and even the series at 1-1 on Saturday, May 24, 2014 with a come-from-behind win. In the bottom of the ninth-inning and the final inning, with a score of 9-4 in favor of Airai and one out, PCC mounted a rally and quickly loaded the bases. Costly defensive errors by Airai and timely hitting allowed PCC to score three runs cutting the lead to only two with two outs. The two teams met again on Tuesday, May 27, 2014 and once again Airai's offense proved too much for the young PCC team. Airai Aces easily won by a score

of 20-10. The fourth game of the 2014 PML Championship was played on Thursday, May 28, 2014.

PCC was in a do-or-die situation while Airai looked to retain the championship. Relying on their experience, Airai took on early 5-1 level in the opening inning. Their offensive attack forced PCC starting pitcher Daily Kinto out of the game. Ray Rumong then came in and managed to keep them off base. Then with a potential tying run at third and the winning run at second, Oreokl Daniel lined a walk-off single to score both the tying of winning runs for a final score of 11-10. In the top of the final inning PCC Mesekiu mounted a rally and managed to score three runs to cut the difficult for a final score of 12-7. Team Airai retained the championship with PCC in runner-up position and Ngerbeched in third position.

POPULATION OF SEA CUCUMBERS BY FABIO SIKSEI

While interning at PICRC, Fabio Siksei assisted in the population studies of the sea cucumber (specifically in Ngardmau State) in relation to the 2012 ban on its exportation. The study highlighted the economical and ecological importance of the sea cucumber. He focused on the reserve in Ngardmau where surveyors used belt-transects to count the number of sea cucumbers present in the area. Mr. Siksei concluded

that further population studies are needed.



TECHNOLOGY PROJECTS BY JOSEPH ANASTACIO



Mr. Anastacio spent his spring semester working on projects for his instructor-directed practicum. His projects included installing anti-virus software, setting up a network, installing ITALC, and creating a Moodle page for Emmaus High School. He also created a Removable Drive Cleaning Software (known as *Joe Anti-Virus*) for the PCC Online Lab. Mr. Anastacio also created a database for the PCC Academic Affairs that stores grades, schedules, etc.

MARINE INVERTEBRATES BY KYAH M. REMELIIK

Ms. Remeliik also interned at PICRC where she conducted a study on the community structure of marine invertebrates. She preserved mollusk, echinoderm, and crustacean samples that she collected from dead corals. The samples were then sorted totaling a collection of 50-707 specimens per location. Ms. Remeliik used the Diversity Index and Shannon & Simpson Index to map and analyze the community of invertebrates in Palau's waters.
