On Friday, May 06, 2016 members of the Phi Theta Kappa International Honors Society (PTK) - Beta Omicron Zeta (BOZ) Chapter held a food drive for their Project Graduation event. The project graduation is an annual event held by the PTK-BOZ members as part of their service to the community. This year, the students hosted a food drive inviting members of the community to donate non-perishable food items, such as canned goods.

TracDat® Training Sessions

On Tuesday, April 26, 2016 and Monday, May 09, 2016 two (2) training sessions were conducted with the staff of the Student Life & Housing Unit of Palau Community College (PCC). The sessions focused on preparing the staff for the implementation of the TracDat® Phase II that will occur this coming fall semester (Fall 2016). The two-day training covered the following components important for the Trac-Dat® Program: mapping of the service area outcomes to Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILOs); 15-Year Institutional Master Plan Strategic Directions Goals & Objectives; ACCJC Standards & Eligibility Requirements; and the Institutional-Set Standards. This training will also be provided to all noninstructional & non-academic service areas of the college in order to prepare all the divisions/service areas for the program's implementation phase this coming fall. The presentation was aimed at students currently enrolled in the Agriculture Science Program or who have yet to declare a major. LRC Instructor Isumechraard K. Ngirairkl, who was the presenter, highlighted the career opportunities available for agriculture science graduates such as nutritionist, product manager, or laboratory technician. She also shared information regarding scholarships and academic funding available for the program's students.

Student Presentations for UB Program

On Friday, May 06, 2016 presentations by Palau Community College (PCC) students enrolled in the Environmental/Marine Science Program and the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) Disciplines Program were held at the PCC Assembly Hall. The presentations aimed to encourage high school students to enroll in the two programs. The high school students who attended the presentations were participants of the Upward Bound Program.

The presentations highlighted the eligibility requirements, core courses, and extra-curricular activities (such as field trips or student presentations) of each program. PCC students who presented also shared their personal experiences regarding the programs' learning environment, lessons, and academic opportunities. High school students were encouraged to ask questions or make comments in order to learn more about the programs.

EMS is an associate of science degree program that provides technical training for students who may choose to work in fields related to environmental or marine science. The program provides the opportunity for students, and employees already in the field, to obtain or improve skills related to scientific research and investigation. Career opportunities for EMS graduates include becoming a marine biologist, aquaculturist, or fishery researcher.

The STEM Disciplines is an associate of arts degree program designed for students who are interested in professional careers in the fields of science, technology, engineering, or mathematics. The program provides basic knowledge and skills focused on subject ares of mathematics & science. Career opportunities for students who graduate from the STEM Disciplines Program include becoming engineers or scientists.


