Itungelbai Bells and Persis Omelau, students in the Environmental/Marine Science Programs, were featured in a symposium on Thursday (May 16, 2013). Each had spent a semester under different agencies that dealt with the environmental issues of Palau.

Bells had interned at Koror State Government where he worked with Ilebrang Olkeriil on the Rare Campaign. He assisted with surveys that aimed to collect information about the level of awareness boaters and fishers have about such conservation sites as *Ngederrak*. Omelau spent the semester working at Palau International Coral Reef Center (PICRC) where she studied the effects of Typhoon Bopha on the corals. She researched about how the storm had affected the corals and biodiversity of the reefs in *Uchelbeluu* and *Ngerchong*.

Both presentations showcased how Palau's environment has changed due to natural and human influences. Members of the Islands of Opportunity Alliance (IOA) - Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation (LSTAMP) Program were present to witness the results of these students' field studies.
