PALAU COMMUNITY COLLEGE CONTINUING EDUCATION DIVISION HOSTS NOONTIME SEMINAR ON IPP BILLING WITH PPUC

On February 2, 2026, from 12:00 PM to 1:00 PM, the Palau Community College (PCC) Continuing Education Division hosted an informative seminar at the PCC Assembly Hall in collaboration with the Palau Public Utilities Corporation (PPUC). The event focused on the important topic of renewable energy and the evolving landscape of energy production related to the Independent Power Producer (IPP) Billing System in Palau.

The seminar brought together PCC staff, students, and community members to learn about PPUC's

initiatives, particularly the IPP Billing System. Attendees gained valuable insights into Palau's transition away from fossil fuels, having already achieved 15% renewable energy and working toward Palau's ambitious goal of 100% renewable energy by 2032.

Representatives from PPUC in attendance were introduced, including Kaya Solomon, the Public Relations Officer, Anthony Rudimch, the Manager for PPIE, Torual Gibbons, the Director of Administration, and Joe Anastacio, a

Attending the Japan-East Asia Network of Exchange for Students and Youths (JENESYS) Program was a meaningful experience for me, both academically and personally. I was part of the Climate Change and Disaster Prevention group, where I learned how Japan approaches preparedness, environmental sustainability, and community involvement. Through discussions and site visits, I saw that disaster prevention in Japan is a shared responsibility, practiced not only by the government but also by communities and individuals in their everyday lives. This made me reflect on the similarities and differences between Japan and island communities like my own.

Financial Analyst. They spoke about the organization's commitment to sustainability and innovation. The discussion highlighted significant developments, such as the establishment of a 10-hectare Independent Power Producer solar farm in Aimeliik, which is set to significantly enhance the nation's renewable energy capacity.

The session also addressed challenges surrounding surplus energy and the implications of the "take or pay" clause in the power purchase agreement, which is designed to ensure investor confidence. There is a minimum amount of power that must be generated to provide to PPUC, and if this minimum is not met, PPUC will charge the provider. Additionally, there is a maximum threshold; if the provider supplies more power than this threshold, PPUC is not obligated to pay for the excess.

Attendees also learned about upcoming projects, including a new battery system supported by an Australian grant. This initiative aims to improve energy storage and efficiency while potentially lowering IPP charges in the future. The new battery system is expected to arrive in Palau in August 2026.

Further discussions took place as a new, detailed billing system was displayed on the screen. Following the directive from Olbiil er a Kelulau to PPUC, the Distributed Energy Rate (DER) has been removed from customer bills. Now, each bill shows the detailed fuel charge (for diesel) and the IPP charge (for solar-generated energy) as separate line

Through these visits, the Upward Bound Math and Science Program is dedicated to ensuring that participants remain focused and empowered as they work towards achieving their educational goals and building a successful future.

The Government of the Republic of China (Taiwan), through its Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA), is pleased to announce the **2026 MOFA Taiwan Scholarship Program**, offering Palauan students an exciting opportunity to pursue **undergraduate, master's, or doctoral degrees**, as well as **public health-related English-taught programs** in Taiwan. Applications will be accepted from **February 1 to March 15, 2026**, giving students the chance to study at commendable institutions while gaining international experience and cultural exposure.

For the 2026 academic year, **twenty (20) scholarship slots** are reserved exclusively for **qualified Palauan students**, subject to final approval by MOFA. Applicants must complete both the **online application** at <https://taiwanscholarship.mofa.gov.tw/Apply> and a printed hard copy by March 15, 2026. Once completed, both forms and all required supporting documents must be submitted to the **Palau National Scholarship Board (PNSB)**. Recipients are expected to be announced by the Embassy by the **end of June 2026**.
