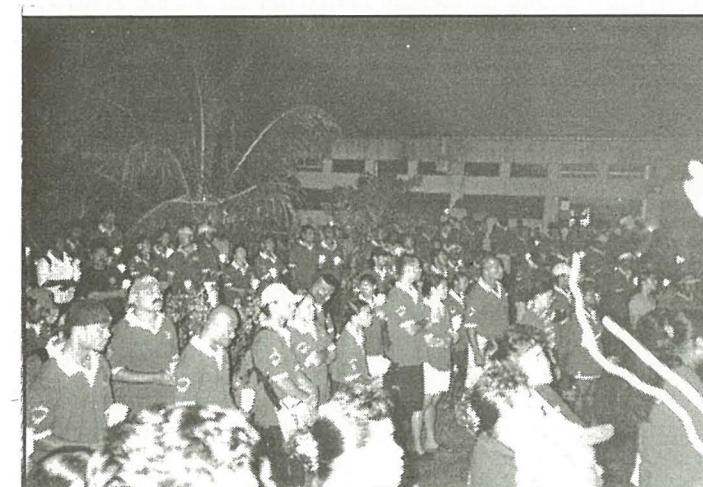

PALAU MOURNS LOSS OF OLYMPIANS

picnickers causing many of them to flee from the rushing waters. While six of them were initially caught by the surging waters, three of them were rescued by other athletes who were safely out of harm's way.

However, three of the athletes namely, Claudia Ngirasob, Rita Sungino, and Dawn Rechemang could not be rescued in time. On Tuesday this week, their remains arrived in Palau accompanied by President of the Palau National Olympic Committee Mr. Alexander Merep, Senator of the Sixth Olbiil Era Kelulau and Chairman of Team Palau 2002 Mlib Tmetuchl, and Minister of State Temmy Shmull, as well as high ranking members of Pohnpei's government and traditional leadership. The latter are here in Palau to pay their respects to these fallen athletes. Further, a delegation from the FSM state of Yap also arrived early this morning in time for the memorial services, also here to pay their respects.

Of the 30 athletes, coaches and officials from PCC who went to Pohnpei, two of them are former teammates of Ngirasob, Sungino and Rechemang. They are Renee Meyar and Norma Adelbai. Thus, the entire PCC family of students and staff join Meyar and Adelbai and express our heartfelt sympathies to the families of these three national heroines. We are so honored that they represented us and our nation so ably at the recently held Micronesian Games in Pohnpei, FSM. Our prayers are with you.

Today, Palau gathers as a nation to mourn the tragic loss of three of her athletes who recently participated in the 2002 Micronesian Games. At 8:30 am, a motorcade will begin from the Hospital Morgue to the Palau National Gymnasium. At the Gymnasium, memorial services for the three athletes namely, Ms. Claudia Ngirasob, Mrs. Rita Sungino, and Ms. Dawn Rechemang, will be held by the Republic of Palau, where the nation's leaders and public will be able to convey their appreciation to these athletes for representing Palau to the 5th MicroGames. All three athletes were members of the Palau Women's Softball Team which garnered Bronze at the Games which were held mid-July to early-August 2002. Palau garnered the most medals at the 2002 MicroGames, securing 71 medals (23 gold, 28 silver, and 20 bronze). During the memorial service, a musical tribute will be performed by PCC Librarian Debra Neas, who composed the song especially for this ceremony honoring the three national heroines.

The tragedy occurred last Sunday when members of the Palau softball team as well as other athletes who had remained in Pohnpei, FSM for a few more days prior to returning to Palau, went on a picnic at one of Pohnpei's famous water falls, Litedunyap Waterfall, located outside the town of Kolonia. Around 2:30pm, a flash flood, apparently caused by the recent heavy rains, surprised the

Contract Teacher Continues Her Support to PCC

Christina O. Kadoi

Christina O. Kadoi attended Melekeok elementary school in 1945 to 1953 and graduated with a diploma. Then in 1953, she attended Palau Intermediate school and graduated in 1956 with her diploma. After she graduated, she then started teaching at Koror Elementary School from 1956 to 1958.

Teaching for two years, Kadoi decided to attend school at Pacific Island Central School in Pohnpei. She graduated in 1961 with a diploma, and returned to Palau and taught at Koror Elementary School from 1961 to 1968. In 1961, Kadoi became a recipient of Trust Territory Scholarship which she attended Literature Production program and received her certificate.

Then, in 1964, she moved on to attend East West Center where she took sewing courses and earned another certificate of achievement. Also, from 1964 to 1968, Kadoi was a teacher Supervisor for elementary education at the department of education here in Palau.

In 1969, Kadoi returned to East West Center to work under Honolulu Community College. While working for East West Center, she received another certificate for Sewing Course. From 1969 to 1980, Kadoi became a full-time instructor at Micronesian Occupational College(MOC). Within those ten years, she attended University of Hawaii from 1973 to 1975. She earned her bachelor's degree in education (Post secondary Education - Trade and Industry). Also, in 1979, Kadoi took Dale Carnegie Course, where she received yet another certificate of completion.

In 1997, Kadoi finally graduated at the University of Guam with her masters degree. This program took her couple years to finish due to untimely schedule of work and teaching here in Palau.

Kadoi has achieved a number of certificates during her years of studying and teaching. Most of her certificates were acquired while she attended several programs during and between her working days. Today, Kadoi is teaching here at Palau Community College, after her retirement as a public elementary school teacher. She hopes to continue to teach here at the College for as long as she possibly can.
